On Tuesday, September 11, 2001 two airliners fully loaded with passengers were hijacked by Islamic terrorists and deliberately flown into the North and South World Trade Center towers in New York City. A third airliner was plowed into the Pentagon in Washington D.C. A fourth, wrested from the terrorists' control by heroic passengers, slammed into an empty field in Pennsylvania, killing no one other than those aboard. In total 2,974 innocent people were murdered in a span of less than two hours.

At the time, my wife was six months pregnant and away at work. My daughter had just turned four and was off at daycare. I was at work without a car as it was in the shop. The phones were temporarily out of order. I had no gun or means of defending anything, and no clue what was coming next. I was no where near any of the crashes. I knew no one in any of the buildings or planes destroyed. But I will never forget that feeling of helplessness. And I will never forget what I learned on Tuesday.




